1. Introduction

The City of Frederick, Maryland is an entitlement community under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). As an entitlement community, the City is awarded a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). As an entitlement community in accordance with accepting CDBG funds, the City of Frederick's Community Development division of Planning is required to prepare its 2019 Annual Action Plan. This is year five (5) of the Plan which outlines the projects and activities designed to meet priority needs in the City's Consolidated Plan and meet the overarching objectives set by HUD. Specifically, HUD's objectives are to provide decent housing, provide suitable living environments, and provide economic opportunities for low to moderate income persons.

The City of Frederick has been awarded \$350,000 for the Grant Year 2019 (July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020), with anticipated program income of \$10,000 from loan repayments and property sales for a total of \$360,000. There are no proceeds from Section 108 loan guarantees. The City also receives income from the Sold on Frederick Revolving Loan Fund when loans are repaid. The City's estimated percentage of CDBG funds that will be expended for low to moderate income persons is 100%; certification are for years 2018, 2019 and 2020.

3. Evaluation of past performance

The City of Frederick has met its timeliness test in draw funds in a timely manner and complete projects and activities. The City and works diligently in the administration of the program and its sub-recipients to maintain timely status in the disbursement of grant funds and strives to be timely. **Status of projects in PY 2018 - Sold on Frederick-** Down payment and closing cost assistance for low to moderate income borrowers. This assistance provides the opportunity of homeownership to 14 low to moderate income households. Goals met HS-3 and HS-1. **Operation Rehab** -Rehabilitation for owner-occupied residential dwellings is available for low to moderate income households. Properties are eligible if in need of

health, safety of code violation corrections. CDBG funds were used to assist one low to moderate income house hold in need of HVAC system replacement. This project utilized the project budget. Goals met HS-1 **Asian Amerian Center Tenant Build- Out** This project provided rehabilitation services for non English speakers seeking naturalization and citizenship. Goals met CD-1 Facility required rehabilitation services to provide classroom space and office areas to assist clients with extensive paperwork and education. Project has been delayed and currently underway; anticipated completed is end of 2018 Grant Year. **Friends for Neighborhood Progress/FCAA Floor Refinishing**– project located at 100 S. Market Street serving over 1,000 very low income homeless persons; rehabilitative efforts included the stripping and refinishing the existing floors at this public facility for safety with the high traffic seen by the clients served; project is underway and anticipated completion is April 2019. **Religious Coalition Hayward Road Sub-Divison/Site Work**- Rehabilitative efforts are underway at 7516 Hayward Road Frederick, MD 21702. This property had two parcels which required sub-division in order to assume ownership of the existing structure to be rehabilitated into Emergency Family Overnight Shelter with 40 overnight beds very low income persons experiencing homelessness. This phase of this project funded by CDBG includes the architectural and engineering and is anticipated to be completed by end of June 2019 Goals met HO-1 and HO-2. **Homeless Services** - Frederick Community Action Agency provided case management services for 91 homeless persons and families through ts, HS-1 to provide homeownership rehabilitation was met, Goals HO-1 & HO-2-; SN-2,CD-1 were met to in accordance with the Consolidated Plan. Activity complete. **Housing Authority of the City of Frederick/Child Care Grant**-activity provided leveraged funds for child care to assist working extremely low income families to continue employment, complete education to gain employment or learn a trade to become employed. 16 extremely low income families served;activity to be complete April 2019; Goals met - ED-1. **Religious Coalition At Risk of Becoming Homeless and Newly Homeless** - provides case managment for low income homeless persons. Goal met -HO-2 Future action plans will adjust based on outcomes, resources and staffing to ensure the City of Frederick is working to meet the goals and priorities in the Consolidated Plan.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

The summary from the Citizens Participation Plan for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program: Annually, through a competitive process, the City awards CDBG grant funds to other public agencies and non-profit organizations to undertake CDBG eligible activities. The City of Frederick, in compliance with the City's Citizen Participation Plan, advertised and held three (3) public forums on the needs of the City of Frederick. On Wednesday February 6, 2019, a public meeting was held for the

applicants, at the beginning of the meeting this passage was read aloud to notify the applicant of the process of funding and the contingency plan if the funds amounts awarded are changed.

We received a Notice CPD -19-01 from HUD dated February 13, 2019 regarding the FFY 2019 Annual Action Plan Guidance on Submitting Consolidated Plans and Annual Action Plan for Fiscal Year 2019

Historically we have completed the draft plan submissions, initiated required citizen participation (publication of proposed plan, notice to public of plan availability, public hearing and 30 day period for comments, and consideration of comments by mid-April in anticipation of the plan submission in mid-May. However, there is likelihood that the program grant amounts for FFY 2019 may not be available by mid-May 2019. Anticipating this as possible outcome, the City stated at the February 6, 2019 Annual Action Plan public meeting the option of conducting the citizen participation on its draft plan with estimated funding amounts in its normal timetable and citizen participation procedures with the understanding to the citizens that these funding levels are estimated and that a contingency provision must explain how it will adjust its proposed plan to match its actual allocation once the amount become known. No public comment on this was received.

The Contingency Plan is as follows – the City programs will be funded first and then the agencies will be funded in accordance to the recommended award amount; in the event the actual amount is less than the actual award, each activity will be reduced by the percentage amount.

The City maintains a mailing list for the CDBG program, and copies of all public hearing notices concerning the program which were emailed to the agencies and individuals on the list and advertised as well as using social media (City's website, press release to media outlets, and twitter.) Public and private agencies were represented on the distribution list.

Developing the Recommended Plan - The City used an Ad Hoc Committee of advisors to assist in the review and recommendation of candidate proposals for the grant year. In addition to the use of social media, a printed notice was placed in the local newspaper, The Frederick News Post on November 1, 2018 notifying the public and interested and eligible organizations of the acceptance of the proposals for the upcoming action plan, the funding process, application guidelines and deadlines to apply.

A "Draft Plan" was available for viewing on the City's website at www.cityoffrederick.com under the Community Development section and print copies available at City Hall 101 N. Court Street, Frederick, MD 21701 and at the Municipal Office Annex 140 W. Patrick Street Frederick, MD 21701 from March 6, 2019 until April 10, 2019 for public review and comment.

5. Summary of public comments

1. Introduction

The City of Frederick elects to hold an open funding round for the CDBG program, local 501(c)(3) non-profit agencies and other government agencies. They are invited to submit applications for funding considerations. City does elect to use a portion of the annual award to execute eligible activities/projects which meet a national objective. Each year, local agencies/organizations and citizens are invited to participate in the consultation process for the CDBG Action Plan through attending public meetings or responding directly to the correspondence. This process is in accordance with the Citizen's Participation Plan.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(l))

Frederick Community Action Agency, a city department regularly consults with the Housing Authority which has housing vouchers and units (when available) for FCAA clients transitioning into permanent housing; Frederick County Housing & Community Development and other social service agencies. **Foster Care** -As the administering agencies for the Maryland Foster Care Program, the Social Services Administration (SSA) of the Maryland Department of Human Resources (DHR) and the local Departments of Social Services are prohibited from discharging children and youth into homelessness. The Maryland Foster Care Program Manual and in directives from the Social Services Administration. The Social Services Administration also has guidelines for using Chafee funds, which also address the issue of housing for youth leaving foster care. These protocols apply to all local Departments of Social Services in Maryland. **Health Care** There are no publicly-funded health care institutions or systems of care in Frederick County, Maryland. The only hospital with inpatient facilities, Frederick Memorial Hospital, is a private not-for-profit institution and does not receive public funding other than Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements/payments for direct patient care. **Mental Health** The Maryland Mental Hygiene Administration (MHA) utilizes Health General Article of Annotated Code 10-809 as its discharge policy for publicly funded psychiatric facilities. The Health General Article of Annotated Code 10-809 prohibits discharges from state facilities to homelessness. Each facility is required to prepare a written aftercare plan. The inpatient hospital social worker or treatment team must complete a needs assessment upon entry. **Corrections** The Frederick County Detention Center is the only Corrections facility institution located in Frederick County, Maryland. The Frederick County Detention Center is a division of the Frederick County Sheriff's Department (local government). The Frederick County Detention Center has developed a protocol to release a list of incarcerated inmates to the Frederick

Community Action Agency (FCAA); the list is updated weekly and typically faxed or emailed to the FCAA. The FCAA uses the list to run the names of inmates through the HMIS database and determine if any of the inmates were homeless prior to incarceration. The process allows FCAA case managers, detention center counselors, and other community-based providers to identify and target certain inmates for homeless assistance, case management, and re-entry assistance and shelter. In addition, Detention Center staff, mental health providers, and homeless providers meet on a monthly basis to identify incarcerated inmates that are chronically mentally ill and coordinate treatment plans; many of the chronically mentally ill inmates were homeless or chronically homeless prior to incarceration. Lastly, a copy of the Pre-Release Policy (Policy No. 4-130) and the Pre-Release Questionnaire are attached; these documents represent the formal policy established by the Sheriff's Department to screen inmates that may be homeless upon release and then connect them with appropriate homeless and mainstream service providers. HOPWA funds for persons with AIDS are returned to the State for reallocation.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The Frederick County Coalition for the Homeless (FCCH), which serves as the CoC for Frederick County, Maryland since 1983. The FCCH meetings and all subcommittee meetings are public meetings that are open to the public; programs and services; the Frederick Community Action Agency (FCAA) provides food, shelter, medical care, housing, transportation, and other forms of assistance to families and individuals who are low-income or homeless. Case managers work directly with the participants in the program and refer them to supportive services. Services may include security deposit, ongoing monthly rental assistance, case management services, information and referral and service planning.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS

The CoC consults and works very closely with the State of Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development that administers the ESG program for ESG non-entitlement jurisdictions. Furthermore, the CoC works very closely with the Frederick County Government and the City of Frederick, which both serve as local government applicants for ESG funding program. The Frederick Rescue Mission does not participate in the ESG program and does not intend to apply. With the exception of the domestic violence program, Heartly House, three (3) of the other ESG providers participate in HMIS which is locally administered by the City of Frederick Community Action Agency.

The City in its Consolidated Plan has discussed in detail the needs of the homeless and special needs populations such as the elderly and those with HIV/AIDS. The City does receive an annual Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) award; however due to limited staff to administer this program, the award is returned to the State of Maryland Department of Health & Mental Hygiene to administer. The City will continue to support the activities of any of the local providers of emergency shelter, transitional housing, supportive housing, or public services for these populations.

The City has a good working relationship with the local banking community which is supportive of the public housing and community development efforts. This year, the City has decided to dedicate its Sold on Frederick loan payback to a revolving loan fund. This program has been in existence for well over ten years and continues to be a valuable tool in assisting first time homebuyers towards the purchase of a single family home. This program has been tremendously successful in the Housing Strategy of affordability. As a well established loan program, dedicating the loan proceeds to a revolving loan fund will allow this program to continue to offer zero percent, no monthly payment loans for down payment and closing cost assistance. The Sold on Frederick Revolving Loan fund in Grant Year 2018 has received \$31,000 in loan repayment funds to date.

Additionally, the City as one of the few entitlement grantees, will use the uncapped income limits in the application of the Sold on Frederick and Operation Rehabilitation programs.

Affordable Housing

AP-55 Affordable Housing – 91.220(g)

Introduction

The City of Frederick will utilize its CDBG funds to rehabilitate existing affordable housing units and to provide down payment and closing cost assistance program to facilitate affordable housing. It is anticipated to assist one low to moderate income household with needed rehabilitation, at least ten (10) low to moderate income households with down payment and closing cost assistance for the purchase of their home, two (2) group homes with six (6) extremely low income special needs households and twenty- four (24) low income senior housing apartment building in need of sidewalk/entrance to building flat work and window replacement.

This year, the City will dedicate the loan proceeds from the Sold on Frederick Down Payment and Closing Cost Loan Program to a revolving loan fund; this effort will sustain the viability of the program to continue offer assistance for the purchase of a single family home.

Discussion

The City is committed to rehabilitating at least one owner occupied single family home and assist 10 households in the purchase of existing units. Rehabilitation will also be undertaken at two group homes serving six households and a senior low income apartment building serving 24 households. AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

It is the mission of the Housing Authority of the City of Frederick (HACF) to address the needs of the extremely low income, very low income, and lower income residents of the City of Frederick. HACF provides affordable housing in the most efficient and effective to qualified individuals in accordance with regulations prescribed by the U. S. Department of Housing & Urban Development, the State of Maryland, Frederick County and the City of Frederick and any other entity providing funding for affordable housing programs. This is achieved by the HACF assisting individuals and families through its public housing communities and Section 8 vouchers.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The City of Frederick has awarded \$10,000 in Child Care Grants to extremely low income persons currently living in public housing. These funds will be leveraged with other grant funds to maximize the amount of funds to be utilized to pay for child care for parents who are currently employed, seeking education/certification for better employment or completion of high school diploma. This program was successful in its use of CDBG funds in GY 2019 and was able to assist 16 families with child care for continued employment, completion of education or trade to become financially independent and improved employment opportunities.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority encourages residents of its public housing units to organize community groups to become more involved in housing management. Neighborhood watch groups to watch for crime and for crime prevention have been formed and assist in ensuring the safety of its residents. Meetings are regularly scheduled to discuss the needs and concerns of the residents; voucher holders are encouraged to attend.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

The Housing Authority of The City of Frederick is not designated as troubled by HUD and is performing satisfactorily in accordance with HUD guidelines and standards.

Discussion

The City of Frederick has identified that there is a need for housing to address the households affected by housing problems, severe housing problems, and housing cost burdens. The Housing Authority is an important part of the City of Frederick's housing strategy.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

The City of Frederick is committed to assist the agencies that provide services for the homeless and special needs persons. To address these needs, the Five Year Consolidated Plan is to serve as the overarching planning document as the strategic plan for the City of Frederick. The following goals and objectives for the City of Frederick's Homeless Strategy have been identified for the five year period of 2015-2019:

- HO-1 Support the Continuum of Care's efforts to provide emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent housing.
- HO-2 Assist providers in obtaining funding for the operation of housing and support services for the homeless and persons at-risk of becoming homeless.

In order to reach these goals, the City of Frederick will cooperate the City of Frederick/Frederick County Continuum of Care, the City of Frederick Housing Authority, the Religious Coalition for Emergency Human Needs and other agencies/organizations committed to reduce and end homelessness.

The City of Frederick Community Action Agency conducts the annual Point-in-Time survey as well provides supportive services to homeless persons and families by providing housing, meals, medical care and counseling at the transitional shelter.

Additionally, the Frederick City Police are familiar with the resources offered by FCAA and help facilitate persons in need to the shelter. 2019 CDBG funds have allocated funds to provide for homeless case management and those at risk of becoming homeless to Frederick Community Action Agency and the Religious Coalition which offers a family day shelter and cold weather shelter.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Frederick's one year goal and actions are continued award of funds for case management for the support of those at risk of becoming homeless, eviction prevention and those currently and chronically homeless. Agencies receiving funds are the Frederick Community Action Agency and the Religious Coalition. The Point-In-Time (PIT) Count is a 24-hour survey or "snapshot" of homelessness and typically includes enumeration at emergency shelters, transitional housing facilities, and other locations such as camp sites, libraries, soup kitchens, and day shelters. A concerted effort is made to count all adults and children that are homeless as defined by the HUD definition of homelessness.

Potentially 316 persons currently homeless as indentified in the Point in Time survey could be assisted in the effort to reduce and end homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

In GY 2018, The City of Frederick awarded funding for the site plan and design work for the property acquired by the Religious Coalition. The Religious Coalition will be converting an old farm house into a 40 bed transitional homeless shelter for families. Due to the extensive rehabilitation of the building to make habitable, this project will take up to two years to complete. IN GY 2018 this underway with site work, architectural, environmental and engineering to estimate the scope of work and cost. The Religious Coalition is committed to move forward with this very important project to create an overnight family shelter with 40 beds; this is the first family shelter in Frederick.

The Religious Coalition offers **EMERGENCY SHELTER FOR HOMELESS ADULTS** The program operates year-round, seven days from 6:30pm-7:00am.It provides a safe refuge for adults who are homeless in our community. Clients are provided with beds, blankets, pillows and shower facilities. Personal hygiene products are available for those that need them. The Alan P. Linton, Jr., Emergency Shelter is an 80 bed shelter, making this the largest year-round shelter in Frederick County.

EMERGENCY SHELTER FOR HOMELESS FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN The Emergency Family Shelter is a program for homeless families with children. The goal of this program is to provide homeless families with children shelter and supportive services, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The program will provide families with case management services for employment and securing permanent housing. This program addresses one of the largest current unmet needs in our community.

This program addresses one of the largest current unmet needs in our community.

The Religious Coalition and United Way of Frederick County have actively addressed the goal from the Frederick County Coalition for the Homeless as zero discharge to homelessness; implementation requires indentification of vulnerability through an early warning system to provide basic intake and refereral to intensive on site assistance of case management.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families

with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The Frederick County Coalition for Homeless recognizes the need for intensive case management services for those at risk of becoming homeless, currently homeless, transitioning out of homeless and prevention from becoming homeless again by linking clients

to health and human service agencies. They have found the first year after homelessness is the most important time period for supportive services to be made available to achieve the highest possible levels of success.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The Maryland Department of Health & Mental Hygiene (DHMH) provides referral services and case management to persons being discharged from institutions to ensure that those persons receive supportive services they need. FCAA also provides referral services and information on affordable housing options in the City in an effort to avoid becoming homeless.

Foster Care (Youth Aging Out):As the administering agencies for the Maryland Foster Care Program, the Social Services Administration (SSA) of the Maryland Department of Human Resources (DHR) and the local Departments of Social Services are prohibited from discharging children and youth into homelessness. The Social Services Administration also has guidelines for using Chafee funds, which also address the issue of housing for youth leaving foster care. These protocols apply to all local Departments of Social Services in Maryland. **Health Care:** There are no publicly-funded health care institutions or systems of care in Frederick County, Maryland. The only hospital with inpatient facilities, Frederick Memorial Hospital, is a private not-for-profit institution and does not receive public funding other than Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements/payments for direct patient care. **Mental Health:** The Maryland Mental Hygiene Administration (MHA) utilizes Health General Article of Annotated Code 10-809 as its discharge policy for publicly funded psychiatric facilities. The Health General Article of Annotated Code 10-809 prohibits discharges from state facilities to homelessness. Each facility is required to prepare a written aftercare plan. The inpatient hospital social worker or treatment team must complete a needs assessment upon entry into the hospital and develop a treatment plan that addresses needs such as mental health, housing, substance abuse, job skills, and life skills. An aftercare plan

is required before release from the hospital; the plan must include medical care, psychiatric care, housing, vocational and social rehabilitation, case management and other supportive services.

Corrections: The Frederick County Detention Center is the only Corrections facility or institution located in Frederick County, Maryland. The Frederick County Detention Center has developed a protocol to release a list of incarcerated inmates to the Frederick Community Action Agency (FCAA); the list is updated weekly and sent to FCAA. The list to run the names of inmates through the HMIS database and determine if any of the inmates were homeless prior to incarceration. The process allows FCAA case managers, detention center counselors, and other community-based providers to identify and target certain inmates for homeless assistance, case management, and re-entry assistance and shelter. In addition, Detention Center staff, mental health providers, and homeless providers meet on a monthly basis to identify incarcerated inmates that are chronically mentally ill and coordinate treatment plans; many of the chronically mentally ill inmates were homeless or chronically homeless prior to incarceration.

Discussion

Regardless of the ongoing efforts provided by The City of Frederick, FCAA, Frederick County, and social service agencies, there still remains a need for permanent supportive housing for the homeless throughout the City of Frederick. The City offers a number of services and programs to citizens; this does address the priority of housing and supportive service needs of persons not homeless but need supportive housing. The elderly population and seniors activities are supported through programs offered by both the City and Frederick County Department of Aging. Special needs services which are not directly provided by the City such as housing for persons with HIV/AIDS, foster care programs, mental health disorders, and substance abuse are addressed by the City through the coordination with social service providers and in part with CDBG funding.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

A variety of barriers such as low wages, federal programs not matching the needs of the persons to sufficiently help and high rental costs are identified which affects affordable housing in the City of Frederick.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The City of Frederick has made efforts to address barriers to affordable housing by incorporating inclusionary zoning with an ordinance for Moderately Priced Dwelling Units (MPDU's) which requires the ratio of 12.5% per every 25 new units built. A density bonus is available to developers as an encouragement to build additional affordable units. The use of zoning as a tool for affordable housing is also featured with mixed housing types which housing types can aid in the provision of affordable units.

Discussion:

The City recognizes the ongoing need for affordable housing and in part the Sold on Frederick program addresses the need to first time homebuyers with assistance with the down payment and closing costs for the purchase of their home.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

The City of Frederick has developed actions to address obstacles to meeting the needs of the underserved to foster and maintain affordable housing, reduce lead based paint hazards, attempt to reduce the number of poverty-level families, and enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The primary obstacle to meeting the needs of the underserved in the City is the limited financial resources available; the City will take the following actions:

Leverage its financial resources and apply for additional public and private funds, provide down payment and closing cost assistance loans, continue support and cooperation with Continuum of Care; promote economic development, provide safety improvements, remove slum and blighting conditions (when identified) in the City.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City of Frederick will fund the following affordable housing project with 2019 CDBG funds:

2019 - 03 Sold on Frederick - Down Payment and Closing Cost Assistance Loans will be available.

2019-04 Operation Rehab - Loan Assistance to primary residential owner-occupied single family homes in need of rehabilitation to correct health, safety or code violations.

2019-09 Community Living - Driveway expansion of existing driveway at two group homes for developmentally disabled adults for greater handicap accessibility.

2019-10 Weinberg House- Repair crumbling exterior flatwork/sidewalks to entrance of building for safety and accessibility; replace windows which are no longer functional and are needed open and close.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The City of Frederick will continue to comply with Title 24 Part 35: Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention in Certain Residential Structures (current rule). Properties built prior to 1978 will require a lead paint risk assessment in accordance with 24 CFR part 35.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

Approximately 11.7% of the City of Frederick's residents live in poverty which is greater than the State of Maryland's rate of 9.6%. Female head of household with children are greatly affected at 22.4%. The goal of the City is to assist other agencies and organizations to reduce the extent of poverty.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City of Frederick's Department of Community Development will coordinate activities among public and private agencies in the City. This coordination will ensure the goals and objectives stated in the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan will be effectively addressed by more than one agency. Efforts are always underway to develop new partnerships to continue the linkage between public and private partnerships.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City of Frederick is committed its partnership and coordination with social service agencies, housing agencies, community and economic development agencies, county, state, federal agencies as well as private and non-profit organizations to serve the needs of the targeted income persons.

Discussion:

Program Specific Requirements

AP-90 Program Specific Requirements – 91.220(l)(1,2,4)

Introduction:

The City of Frederick will receive an annual allocation of CDBG funds in the amount of \$350,000 with anticipated program income of \$10,000 for FY2019

One hundred percent (100%) of CDBG funds will be used for activities to benefit low to moderate income persons. The overall benefit of a three year period of 2018,2019 and 2020 is serving 100% low to moderate income persons.
